Create "found poems" from magazine clippings to review concepts discussed in class.



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Oh No - Not a Worksheet!

- Cut 3 to 4-foot pieces from a large roll of colored paper. Write 10 to 15 questions all over the paper. Give each group of 4 to 5 students one large "worksheet" and one marker. The first group to finish the questions stands up and yells, "GO PATRIOTS!"
- Type a list of vocabulary and definitions or concepts and explanations. Make copies, cut into blocks, and put blocks in an envelope. Groups of 4 or 5 students match the contents of one envelope. Groups compete to match blocks first.
- Cut a 10 to 15-foot piece from a large roll of paper. Write concepts spaced out across the paper, and tape the paper on the wall. Assign concepts to pairs of students who will write an explanation and create a visual. Great activity at the end of a unit!
- Tape strips with unit topics on the wall. Give every student a smaller strip with a term, phrase, or description relating to one of the concepts. Students tape the correct smaller strip under the unit topic.
- Give groups a large, colored sheet of paper and a small sheet of symbols indicating reactions to what they read. Students cut out and glue symbols on the colored sheet, then write or draw responses. See the Template TOOLBOX.
- Create mobiles that summarize content learned.
- Create foldables. Fold paper lengthwise like a hotdog bun. On the right side, cut one-inch horizontal strips toward the center fold. On the front side each strip, write a vocabulary word; on back side, write its definition.
